




## **PW BIBLE STUDY**

### PARKING LOT & MORE


After receiving six bids from asphalt repaving contractors, the Board of Trustees and Session approved Dorsey Paving, Inc. to repave the west parking lot of the church, starting on September 15. The repaving will be paid for in a three-way split between:

- The IPC Endowment,
- Church investments,
- A parking reserve fund of the trustees.

Session also approved establishing a rain garden in the island between the entrance and the exit of the parking lot off Julian Avenue. The parking lot will be sloped so that the majority of the rain run-off water will soak into the rain garden instead of being carried into the street and the sewer system, eventually going into the river. Session sees this as a great "green" solution that prevents the seepage of chemicals from the asphalt into the river system.

### IPC FINANCIAL UPDATE

The Finance Committee and Session are greatly encouraged that during these uncertain times that the congregation has stayed consistent with their contributions. In fact, as of the end of July, the congregation is ahead in their giving pattern, \$133,737 compared to a budget expectation of \$125,667. With these contributions and lower expenses due to the closing of the building for so long, the church budget shows a surplus of \$56,188 in July, compared to a July 2019 deficit of \$36,354.

Of particular interest to some (namely, Rev. Heimach), the Year to Date electricity expense is only \$4061 which is \$3500 less than forecasted. Solar panel electricity production continues to provide a good measure of this savings.

The Pandemic Relief fund is at \$7,238 and is available to IPC members who have financial needs due to the economic decline caused by the pandemic. Congregation members can contact either pastor for more information about this.





#### **FINDING HOPE IN COVID**

Over the last 6 months we have experienced many adjustments and changes to our everyday lives. And most of it has been centered around being alone and isolation from family, friends, and our social activities.

At first, it didn't seem this would last for long. I don't know how you felt when you heard the stay at home order announced but I felt a little relief. Now maybe I won't be so tired, and I can get some rest.

I didn't have get up as early since I didn't have to travel to work. I just had to walk to the other room. The biggest challenge was figuring out all of the virtual meeting applications. Keeping just my head in the screen because I was in my pajamas and where is the mute button. It was a different type of world.

At the same time, my brother was in the hospital waiting for a heart transplant. Then a call out the blue from my sister that my brother-law had been admitted to ICU and she was told to quarantine for two weeks! Quarantine? What did that mean? The next call was my brother-in-law was now on a ventilator. What in the world is going on? Now COVID-19 is not just on the news, it is in the my family. It is scary and prayer without ceasing is in order. 1 Thessalonian 5:17

At this point, my days are filled with trying to navigate working from home daily and virtual meetings while receiving text updates on my two brothers. Each week we are learning of people we know dying from this horrible virus. By the third week I am drained and feeling alone. How do I cope? Spending time in the Bible and prayer helped me keep my sanity. My Lent study was about the attributes of God. I needed the reassurance of God's Faithful covenant.

I worried about my brothers being alone in the hospital without family being present. How can we encourage them and help them return to full health if we couldn't see them? I prayed for angels to be at their side. I prayed they would regain their strength and feel our prayers. I felt this was the best I could do considering the circumstances. I had to have hope. Then I read Psalm 33:10-22

My summary thoughts were and still are ...My hope during COVID-19 is in God the ruler over all the inhabitants of the earth and He will restore us. His love is unfailing. I am grateful God has restored the health of my brothers. And now 6 months later my hope is in God alone.

10The LORD frustrates the plans of the nations and thwarts all their schemes.
11But the LORD's plans stand firm forever; his intentions can never be shaken.
12What joy for the nation whose God is the LORD, whose people he has chosen as his inheritance.
13The LORD looks down from heaven and sees the whole human race.
14From his throne he observes all who live on the earth.
15He made their hearts, so he understands everything they do.
16The best-equipped army cannot save a king,

nor is great strength enough to save a warrior.

17Don't count on your warhorse to give you victory—
for all its strength, it cannot save you.

18But the LORD watches over those who fear him,
those who rely on his unfailing love.

19He rescues them from death
and keeps them alive in times of famine.

20We put our hope in the LORD.
He is our help and our shield.

21In him our hearts rejoice,
for we trust in his holy name.

22Let your unfailing love surround us, LORD,
for our hope is in you alone.
