Lighting the Christ Candle

IRVINGTON INTERIM WORK

"Prepare the way of the Lord. Make straight a highway for our God."

This is the Advent plea. First spoken in Isaiah and repeated by John the Baptist in the wilderness. Advent is a time of preparation and for Interim Ministers, there is no better analogy. Interim Pastors are most often called into church under two circumstances. The first situation is when a church has had a troubled pastorate. Second is when churches have had a long pastorate. Now, it is probably easy to imagine why you would invite an Interim into a church following a troubled pastorate. The question some ask is, "Why invite an Interim into a church following a long-pastorate, especially a long-pastorate which seemed to have been successful?"

By all accounts Bob Heimach's 18-year tenure here at Irvington Presbyterian Church was a successful one. No doubt he had his share of human foibles, but so will your next pastor. Bob did a good job. Which is wonderful. However, there are reasons you call in an Interim following a long and successful pastorate. Pastors are called to shepherd their congregations and congregations are asked to follow where they lead. In the best situations, a relationship of trust develops and in the mutual respect between the pastor and members, there is comfort, ease, challenge, and growth. Over time, the congregation will naturally reflect the value system and character of the pastor. This imaging of the pastor is a good thing.

However, when a pastor leaves, some of these "good things" no longer make sense. The congregation may realize that certain mission initiatives were the pet projects of the former pastor and now that he/she is gone, the interest left with the pastor. A congregation may find that certain programs were led so much by the former pastor, that no one wants to continue them. A congregation might even discover there are rituals in worship so connected to the former pastor that to continue them would seem out of place. Overall, the congregation is left to wonder, "Now what do we do and who are we without Pastor X?" The calling of the Interim is to help the congregation claim the church for itself. You may find there are certain ministries,



missions, and rituals you really want to continue. They have become who you are. You will also find that it is ok to let go of some good things. They served you well for a season, but now it is time to do something else.

Advent is the season of the church year which is all about "preparing the way." We are getting ready to celebrate the birth of Jesus. We are also looking forward to the return of Christ. Integral to Advent is John the Baptist who cried out in the wilderness, "Prepare the way for the Lord! Make straight a highway for our God!"

Interims are a bit like John the Baptist. We are clearing a path so the person who comes after us will have a way to initiate their own ministry. Interims do not force change, but we do encourage it to happen. We want the new pastor to feel like they are walking into a situation not haunted by the practices, policies, and agreements of the former pastor.

Over the next year or so, we will develop a "mission study" which will allow the congregation to describe who they are without the former pastor. What do you value? What do you want to continue? Where does your interest lie? Where will you invest your time, your energy, your money? Who do you want your next pastor to be?

Once we have completed that step, we will move onto to elect at Pastor Nominating Committee who will go about the task of seeking the next pastor called to lead your church. This is all part of preparing the way we will do as a congregation.

One of the most confusing parts of all this is when people ask, "Why can't Pastor Bob or Pastor Galen visit us or officiate at funerals and weddings? They have known us for so long." There is no question the former pastors know you well. However, you want to start to make room in your heart for the new pastor. If the former pastor keeps officiating at services and visiting members at the nursing homes, then you will naturally hold onto that relationship. The new pastor may feel "outside" of his or her own church. We don't want that to happen. Former pastors are asked to make it easy for the incoming pastor by refusing requests to "pastor," and by restraining themselves from visiting their former congregants. They were grateful when the pastor who was here before them stopped visiting parishioners when they arrived on the scene. Now it is the polite thing to do for them to stop too. Time for them to step away. We give thanks for the former pastors, as we find ways to respect and welcome the new ones.

CHRISTIAN EDUCATION UPDATES

As the weather turns cold, the Ramblers (ages 2 or 3 years up through kindergarten) will be meeting indoors more frequently. While we strongly encourage mask wearing, children that young are not always able to do so, or to do so correctly. I wrote this story in 2015 JACK'S but believe it's one of the best Christmas stories ever.

> A new Pastor and his wife were assigned to return to a church in Brooklyn, N.Y., and arrived in October very excited. When they first saw the church, it was run-down and in need of much work, so they set a goal to have the first service on Christmas Eve. Repairing pews, plastering

walls, painting etc., and on December 18th they were done. On December 19th, a large rainstorm hit the area for two days. On December 21st, the Pastor went to the church and found the roof had leaked on an area about 20' x 8' and plaster had fallen from the wall breaking the pulpit. The Pastor cleaned up the mess and decided to postpone the Christmas Eve service. On his way home, he passed a flea market sale for charity. He noticed a handmade ivory tablecloth with a cross embordered right in the center. It was large enough to cover the hole in the Church wall.

On the way back, it started to snow. He noticed a woman running for the bus, which she missed. The Pastor had her wait in the warm church for the next bus. She sat in a pew while the Pastor hung the tablecloth. He could not believe how beautiful it looked. The woman walked down the aisle; her face looked as if she had seen a ghost. The woman asked if she could check to see if the initials "EBG" were in the corner. These were her initials. She explained that she made this cloth, thirty-five years before, in Austria. She and her husband were well-to-do before the war. When the Nazis came, she was forced to leave her husband, with him to follow later. He was captured, and she never saw him or her home again.

The Christmas Eve service was wonderful, and the church was full. After the service, when people were leaving, an old man continued to sit in the pew. The man asked the pastor where he got the tablecloth because it was identical to one his wife had made. He told the pastor the same story about the Nazis. The pastor asked the man to take a ride with him and went to a house on Staten Island. He knocked on the door and saw the greatest Christmas reunion he could imagine. God does His work in mysterious ways.
