Dear Presbyterians,

I like to give out books to people. If I have read and like a book I will give it to you, partly because I really liked it and think you would enjoy it, but mostly because I want all the information immediately dumped into your brain so we can talk about it right that moment. It never works that way, but it won't stop me from wanting it. I don't even really care about getting the book back as long as you read it. I have to date given away ten copies of Parker Palmers book "Let Your Life Speak". As soon as I run out, I immediately order three more. You never know when the opportunity to obtrusively give out reading requirements to an unsuspecting person may arise.

This happened last week when a friend's mom called to say that she was coming by to drop off a donation for the church. She's not even and member of IPC and do you know how I responded to her kindness? I gave her homework. "Hi, nice to see you again. Thank you for the donation, and here a thousand-page history book on the early church for you slog through. You're welcome" That will teach her to be nice to Presbyterians.

Then I went up to my office to order another copy. The book is called "The Story of Christianity" by Justo L Gonzalez and it describes the writings and practices of the early church communities. How they were forming and evolving, even how they responded under threat. Practices that they took to keep themselves safe in an unsafe time. Worshiping in small groups, home churches. They were the original quaran-team. Leaders wrote letters to keep up with their communities. The world and the church was changing constantly, and how to practice being a follower of Christ looked and felt different to different people. They were learning and leading as they went.

This feels very relatable as we continue to navigate new ways of practicing being followers of Christ in a evolving and changing world. And at its core, how do we do it keeping ourselves and one another safe. Home churches, leaders having to communicate from a distance. Groups meeting to worship in secret, risking being caught by the "authorities". That last one's not directed to any specific group of members living at Westminster or anything.... I think those early church mothers and fathers would be proud that the church continues to find ways to be the church even in the face of challenges. That we continue to seek safe ways to worship. I'm sure someday books will be written about this time in Church history. About online choirs, parking lot meetings, sharing Communion from our homes, separated but together. Books will be written about the calls and the care, the creativity, the commitment and mostly the Christ fueled acts of those 2020 Christians. And maybe those books will be given out generations later to remind our descendants how we were the church separated but together in this time. I hope so.

"Masks by Mitchell" For Mexico




NEW 6-WEEK BIBLE STUDY

collection point in entryway of the church. Baskets will be filled on Friday, December 11 (more details coming soon.)




ORGAN/PIANO CONCERT

On October 3rd, Team Purple Strides walked nearly 4 miles in the Walk to END Alzheimer's. Denise Harrington was the team captain. The walk this year was virtual and everywhere, which allowed participants to walk alone, with family and in their neighborhoods. The weather was perfect for walking on the Fall Creek East trail for the Purple Striders. The opening ceremony was virtual, and the team was able to watch it before taking off to walk. The symbol for the walk is the pinwheel and each color has a meaning. Orange represents support for the cause, purple symbolizes a love one lost to the disease, yellow denotes a caregiver for someone with Alzheimer's or dementia, blue indicates someone living with Alzheimer's or dementia and white represents the eventual 1st Survivor of Alzheimer's. Every dollar raised counts and helps to provide research to end this disease.

Denise walked in memory of her mother, paternal grandmother and for caregivers who are caring for









someone with Alzheimer's and other Dementias. Those who joined Denise at the walk have also been affected in some way by this disease. Irvington Presbyterian Church is a Support Group location for the Alzheimer's Association.
